


Future Farmers show fruits of their harvest


Their initiation banquet was held at the beginning of the school year to welcome all new members and upon becoming a member they enjoyed parties, parties, and more parties.

Drama out-performs leading competition








Cross-Country takes 3rd in State!




It's Monkey Man!






Many big, strong, and husky fellows were seen working out in the cafeteria of our school during the months of December, January, and February. These husky guys were the wrestling team.


The wrestling team had a big season this year. With the help of Coach Duce and an extra helper, Coach Milbrant, these boys were raring to go.

They proved it was a successful year by making a victory over Snake River, the first time in many years.


Many colorful lockers were seen the day fifteen boys went to District. The Wrestling Rally Squad decorated the teams' lockers in hopes this would give them a big boost.










Smack!
