
The choir worked hard selling various items at games trying to raise money for their spring tour. They also sold "Swingers" to the public as a way of financing their tour.







Rodeo Club represented P.H.S. well throughout the year.



During the basketball season, part of the band was divided into a group called the Essex. They performed at games and in various contests.


The band bought new uniforms and recruited many new members. Our band was one everyone was proud of this year.






Undying spirit was exerted by the cheerleaders at all the games.
