We are proud he chose to return to Preston to share his wisdom and enthusiasm for living with us. It is with this pride we dedicate this yearbook to Onan T. Mecham.






Choir Organized New Group





Of course, it wasn't all work. Many parties were held. They had a traditional Mexican Christmas party where they broke a pinata. The pinata was made by the class and filled with candy.






All the officers went to Twin Falls for the state convention. Val Reeder and David Trujillo went to Kansas City for the national convention.




The Pep Club sponsored a very successful 50's Day and 50's Dance. In both, students wore the fashionable dress of the 1950's.






G.A.A. Supports Involvement of Girls in Sports








The Junior Varsity were S-U-P-E-R. They won 18 of their 20 games, defeated only by Shelley and Snake River.










New Track Helps The Girls' Track Team

Members of the Girls' Track Team were the best in all the district. The reason? They had a new track to run and get a good workout on.


